Across Ohio, the HUBs were able to support their clients who were associated with one particular managed care plan in attending preventative visits at a rate 10% higher than the overall population.



Jill, a CHW at Baby University, began to work with a client who was experiencing domestic violence, financial struggles, and was without health insurance. The CHW and client began meeting monthly. A relationship was established with a mobility mentor, allowing access to parenting classes and thrive classes. The CHW was also able to successfully connect the client with JFS benefits for her and her daughter. Over the next six months, the CHW-client team worked together to create a self-sustainable plan. The client was able to save money working as a home health aid and eventually remove herself from the domestic violence. The CHW and client keep in touch to this day—and the mom and daughter are thriving.



Jocelyn, a CHW at Dayton Children's Hospital, supported a young mother through her pregnancy, helping her navigate critical health and social challenges. When they met, Jocelyn secured an OBGYN and attended her first visit. As their relationship grew, she connected her to a dentist, discussed safe sleep and nutrition, and helped prepare her for motherhood. When financial hardships led to the loss of her car and housing, Jocelyn linked her to Homefull for stable housing and provided bus passes so she could continue working. As she opened up about her mental health, Jocelyn secured her a therapist, and when her employer unlawfully terminated her, Jocelyn helped her access Legal Aid, which won her unemployment benefits. Through all of this, she remained determined, and after thoughtful conversations, she decided to enroll in Kettering College to become a respiratory therapist and made the dean's list in her first semester.
